




# Where to find the legal aid statistics

- Found on the .gov.uk site; (also the top hit when you google 'Legal aid statistics')
- Previous releases remain available
- Quarterly releases (Sept, Dec, Mar)
- Each June our Annual covers additional areas such as Client diversity and Providers



# What do we publish?

- Bulletin: main report giving commentary.
- Tables: A set of tables, which give further detail and full time series for each area.
- More detailed data: A detailed file to allow detailed analysis provided in both .csv (comma separated values) and .ods (OpenDocument Spreadsheet) formats



- Index of data in Legal aid statistics: An index to the more detailed data published with lists of available data and guidance on how to work with the more detailed data using pivot tables.
- **User Guide** to legal aid statistics: This provides comprehensive information about data sources and quality as well as key legislative changes.

# What has changed about... the bulletin?

- More concise: 50+ pages down to 10
- New design front page gets straight into the headline figures
- Less preamble and repetition, with background info moved into separate User guide.
- Same data and detail released as before

# Legal Aid Statistics quarterly, England and Wales, April to June 2017

## Main points

Crime lower workload
down 4% compared to the
same quarter last year

This continues the gradual downward trend of recent years. Expenditure on completed work was also down, by 3%.

Crown Court completed workload down 12% compared to the same quarter last year Expenditure on completed work fell by 11% over this period, and new orders for legal representation in the Crown Court continued to decline.

14% fewer legal help new matter starts than in the same period of 2016

The volume of completed claims also decreased, by 9% and expenditure by 3%.

Family mediation starts were 24% lower than in the same quarter of 2016

Mediation Information and Assessment Meetings
(MIAMS) and mediation outcomes also fell over this period.

26% more certificates completed for public family law than in the same quarter last year

Expenditure on completed work in this category, which already accounts for more than half the total cost of civil legal aid, rose by 17% (£18m).

533 applications for Exceptional Case Funding received in the last quarter

This is similar to Jan-Mar 2017 (536) but 26% higher than Apr-Jun 2016. The proportion of applications granted this guarter was 57%.

#### Main point

Workloads and expenditure fell in most areas of criminal legal aid between April and June 2017 and the same period of the previous year.


Criminal legal aid is sometimes categorised into Crime Lower and Crime Higher. Crime Lower includes pre-charge, police station, early court (including magistrates' court) and prison law work. Crime Higher covers work in the Crown and Higher Courts.

## Magistrates' court completed work





Legally-aided representation in the magistrates' court comprised around one-third of the workload and just under half of expenditure in Crime Vower between April and June 2017. The volume of completed work in the magistrates' court fell by 11% in this quarter when compared to the same period of the previous year. Expenditure also fell by 11% (£4m).

The other area of court work within Crime Lower is in the virtual courts. This accounts for a small proportion of workload, and less than half a percent of all crime lower expenditure, but has grown over the last few years. Workload this quarter was, however, 20% down on last year and expenditure fell by 19%.

### Crown Court completed work






Volumes of cases completed in the Crown Court have declined over recent years but more gradually than new orders, due to longer-running cases still awaiting trial

#### Introduction

Legal Aid Statistics in England and Wales is published every quarter, presenting statistics on activity in the legal aid system. This statistical release consists of the following documents, all published at: <a href="https://www.gov.uk/government/collections/legal-aid-statistics">https://www.gov.uk/government/collections/legal-aid-statistics</a>

- Bulletin: The bulletin provides key figures and commentary;
- Tables: A set of tables which give further detail and full time series for each area;
- Data visualisation tool: This interactive tool, which enables the user to analyse each area of the statistics in more detail using graphs and data filters;
- More detailed data: A more detailed set of data, provided in csv (comma separated variables) and ods (open data spreadsheet) files, to enable detailed analysis using a variety of software packages; and
- Index of data: An index to the more detailed data published in the csv and ods files, lists of available data from legal aid systems and guidance on how to work with the more detailed data using pivot

#### tables.

As part of our wider work on improving data visualisation and accessibility, we have developed this data visualisation tool which sits on top of the more detailed data released alongside the publication and its associated csv and ods files - the tool provides users with the capability to:

- interrogate the published information at a lower level of detail, e.g. by offence and area of work
- access and produce a range of charts specific to their user requirements.






